Worship This Week Nov. 6, 2022

When you came to Christ, you were "circumcised," but not by a physical procedure. Christ performed a spiritual circumcision—the cutting away of your sinful nature. – Colossians 2:11

We're not going to spend a lot of time on this first two sentences, other than to say that circumcision was a right of passage in the Jewish nation prior to the establishment of the church of Christ. It was physical. Christ came to fulfil the law, the old covenant, which means most of that was replaced by one single requirement – to believe. When that happens, the burden of our sinful nature is removed. We are cut off from the requirements of the old law and we are joined with the new covenant. It's spiritual, not physical.

We're going to focus on the next verse.

For you were buried with Christ when you were baptized. And with him you were raised to new life because you trusted the mighty power of God, who raised Christ from the dead." -- Colossians 2:12

This is not an easy concept. To be buried with Christ. In the most basic sense, it means we are invited to suffer with Christ, to experience what He went through.

In traditional baptism, the person is lowered or dunked into the water. It involves the entire body immersed or buried in water. And then quickly lifted out or raised. Of course, we don't do that with infants – it's more of a dedication for them because they can't make the decision for themselves. Parents do it for them. Baptism is a spiritual ceremony used to mark a spiritual transformation. When we enter that place of understanding and acceptance of Christ as the one true way to God – which could be as a child or as an adult at any stage of life – we are raised to new life. Baptism – or profession of faith if we've been baptized as a baby – is just a public affirmation of this rebirth.

"And with him you were Raised to new life because you trusted the mighty power of God, who raised Christ from the dead."

All we have to do to have this new life is trust in God. We are raised to new lift with Christ *because* we trust in God the Father.

In God we trust is way more than a phrase on American currency. It happens to be the official motto of our friends to the south. If only the nation truly lived that way. Not to get side tracked, but it's worth a bit of exploration.

In God we trust is a paraphrase of Psalm 56:11 – "I trust in God, so why should I be afraid? What can mere mortals do to me?"

It's also inspired by Psalm 115:9-11 – "O Israel, trust the Lord! He is your helper and your shield. 10 O priests, descendants of Aaron, trust the Lord! He is your helper and your shield. 11 All you who fear the Lord, trust the Lord! He is your helper and your shield."

Interesting and telling fact – "In God we trust" became official in the 1950s, at the height of the Cold War, in clear contrast to the official atheism of the Soviet Union. A literal translation of Paul's original Greek words reads like this: "Having been buried with him in baptism in which also you were raised with Him through the faith of the working of God the one having raised Him out of the dead." "Working of God." Let's look at that. It's where we get the word "energy." In this case, it's superhuman. It's God's energy which transitions the believer from point to point in his plan. It's energy that's beyond our imagination. It's what allows us to do God's work. In fact, it's not us, but it's God working though us.

A key part of this definition is that it's "efficient." Not too much, not too little. Just the right amount. Raised to new life with Christ. Raised with Him. Raised together. There's this ongoing theme of being with Christ. We know that, on a human scale, two people working together, in sync, is powerful. It's more than just twice the brain power and muscle. It's when we finish each other's sentences. When we're on the same wavelength. When we forget something, our partner remembers. When something doesn't make immediate sense, our partner gets it.

Now imagine that partner is none other than the Son of God. Not that we are equals in any sense of the word. He's 10,000 feet tall and move mountains. But in the same way He came to occupy a human body and live with us – and die for us –

The Spirit of Christ is willing to occupy our body and live with us. Do we let him in? Easy to say. Let him in. Allow the Holy Spirit to our constant companion. Make generous room in our heads, hearts, homes, workplaces, communities. It should go without saying that we should make Jesus the primary focus of the church – He should occupy every square inch of this building and every sentence of our statements of belief.

Is it all about Him? Take a second and quietly ask Him.

If we trust in God and are truly raised to new life in Christ, then we can boldly invite Christ to our side. When we begin each new day, we can say "Lord, I will draw near to you today." When we leave the house, we can say, "Lord, I will walk with you today." As we are driving down the road, we can say, "Lord, I will follow the path you lead, the direction you take."

That journey will be a new and blessed life devoted to God.
